

How an old dog taught us a few new tricks

There is just something about an older dog that touches our hearts here at MHS. Many times they come with a history, and sometimes not. Whatever the circumstances, when an older dog comes to us, we know they need to find a loving home soon. They are more fragile. They are at times misunderstood. They are on borrowed time. That time is precious – it is something to cherish.

Chester, a twelve-year-old, chestnut Labrador retriever, was surrendered to us after being adopted a few years ago. Unfortunately, due to a change in their lifestyle, his family could no longer care for him. When the staff learned that a senior dog had been surrendered to us, we became concerned about the likelihood of Chester being happy and comfortable in a noisy, fast-paced environment. So, staff and volunteers together made a special effort to make sure that Chester had the space, exercise, and quiet time that he needed by taking him for daily walks, taking him to shelter

dog class, and allowing him to join the adoption staff at the front desk so he could have some company during the day. And if he needed some quiet time, Lisa, our Canine Coordinator would put him in her office so he could stretch out and relax by himself.



Chester had a beautiful, mild-mannered behavior. He would greet everybody quietly with a tail wag as he gratefully accepted a scratch under his chin and a pat on the head. Never jumpy, Chester had a way of connecting with people by looking at them with his soulful brown eyes and sometimes even rewarding them with a "paw-shake." Chester loved to have someone near him, and he would lean on them, or lie at their feet when someone stopped to visit. Though generally quiet in nature, when Chester noticed a staff member or volunteer with his leash and harness, a charge of energy would flow through him and he would bounce and wag his tail knowing he was going to go for a walk. When Chester was put up for adoption it didn't take long for a family to fall in love with him. We all were so happy that Chester was finally going home again.

The summer season flew by, and we heard that Chester was coming back to the shelter. Due to a health concern in the family, they were no longer able to keep Chester in their

home. They were very upset. He continued to exhibit his sweet personality, and was put up for adoption once again as a healthy senior dog. But this time, very few people were interested in adopting him. So he remained at the shelter for a long time. Chester became depressed and would barely eat. He was not connecting with people as much as he had before. Staff and volunteers were committed to keeping him as happy and comfortable as possible. In fact, Eric, a shelter technician, took him home at night so Chester could have a buddy to sleep with. We then decided to make Chester the *Pet of the Week* and published his story in the local paper and online. Shortly after, phone calls and interested adopters came pouring in for Chester. And because he was given the attention he needed, he began acting like himself again. Much to our joy, he was adopted again soon after by a loving family that understands him and cherishes their time together. To this day, we are still receiving phone calls for Chester.

While he was with us, Chester made us all pause for a moment during each day to consider what it means to be truly compassionate – not just for Chester, but for each other. We will miss you, precious Chester. We are so thankful to be able to help you find your way home!

t's been a year since I wrote my very first column for this newsletter and as I look back on the past year, I see a lot to be thankful for during this season of giving thanks. A few specific blessings: Our staff: Day in and day out, the MHS staff provide loving care for both the animals and the people we encounter. It's tough emotional and physical work – performing 30 spay/ neuters in one of our public clinics, caring for a pack of 25 dogs in daycare, teaching owners how to best welcome a new puppy into their home in Puppy Kindergarten, providing a sense of security to a scared stray puppy

found in a rainstorm or comforting a cat owner who can no longer provide the care her cat needs. Tears are shed, hugs are given, smiles and laughter are shared every day.

Our volunteers: No doubt, we would not be able to do what we do every



day without the corps of volunteers who do so much for us. Kitten fosters, cat socializers, dog walkers, event organizers...we wouldn't exist without you here every day cleaning kennels, entering data and petting our bunnies.

Our donors: While I'd love to pay the electric bill in puppy kisses or cats purrs, the utility company does like to have cash. And our donors - from the estate gifts we receive, to the cash collected at a 9-year-old's birthday party and the checks that come in every day – are incredibly generous.

Our community: Families who adopt that older cat with a few medical issues, the law enforcement officers who bring us the lost yellow lab found wandering on a busy street, the Sunday School class who bakes dog biscuits and collects donations for us, customers who buy from our retail shop in support of the shelter...all help us promote and provide for the well-being of animals.

A year from now, I know I will have even more blessings to count - more volunteers working with our more challenging animals, stronger financial support from the broader community, and a deeper presence throughout the Monadnock region as we foster a compassionate community. I hope you'll join me in celebrating our blessings.


We would like to thank everyone involved in making this event so successful (we raised over \$37,500, surpassing our goal!). A round of applause to the volunteer Hair Ball committee:


