The brothers had spent the first six years of their life together when they found themselves in temporary emergency boarding at MHS as their human family came upon hard times. Since they were housed in a staff area, we really got to know them and their wonderful "purr" sonalities.

Rocky, a grey and white longhair, often had an inquisitive nature and look on his face. His eyes were always wide

open, his head slightly tilted, watching everything you were doing. He would meow and roll on his back for belly rubs. Precious, a short-haired brown tabby, was much more reserved. However, he loved to give head butts and sit in your lap. He had such a serious, intense look on his face, and yet he would chirp and move toward you so you could pet him. Only when you passed his test would he rub up against you. They were quite a pair!

Unfortunately, their family could not reclaim them and so we put Rocky and Precious up for adoption so their new family could find them. With their close bond, we knew they had to be adopted together and even had a special adoption rate for the pair. Rocky and Precious loved being on the adoption floor and greeting the constant stream of visitors through our doors. What charming greeters they were—even the nearby kittens couldn't hold the attention of all our visitors! When they were featured as our Pet of the Week in the local paper, several people called to "sponsor" Rocky and Precious which helped us care for them.

June went by, and Rocky and Precious were still waiting. Then, July began slipping by. The Staff (by now, utterly enchanted with the boys) was discussing who amongst them was going to adopt them. And





then on July 26th, Rocky and Precious found a home! The couple originally only wanted one cat who would be a lap cat and provide much needed company for a quiet home, but when they were introduced to Rocky and Precious, it was love at first sight! They knew immediately they had found the perfect companions for them. There was no question for them, either—these brothers needed to be together. Congratulations, Rocky and Precious, we will miss you but we are so happy for you!

Bev and her husband, Bob, were long time MHS board members and supporters. She was always lending a hand, no matter what activity we were undertaking. Earlier this spring when we honored Jim Guinane there was Bev, setting up appetizer tables and arranging all the food. She definitely enjoyed planning a great party!

But what struck me most about Bev was how much she cared about our staff—sending cards at special times, checking in and saying hello when she was nearby. At the holidays, a giant tower of goodies from Harry & David's appeared – of course they were from Bev and the staff enjoyed them for days to come.

Bev will be greatly missed—I was looking forward to getting to know her better as we worked together to create a more humane community. Although she's no longer with us, I know Bev is cheering us all on as we continue to build on our past successes, many of which are due to her great kindness and caring for the animals and the people we serve.

I think of Bev often and still have a hard time realizing she will not be at the next meeting for MHS. She leaves behind a legacy of love and kindness that all who knew her (and many that didn't) will miss.

When the previous attempts at developing a therapy dog program had faltered, Bev Therrien put her arm around my shoulder and brought me before the MHS Board of Directors. Her support for a volunteer-led initiative resulted in today's Monadnock Therapy Pets (MTP.) In conjunction with MHS Training Center classes, MTP has assisted 25 teams become registered since 2010.

Today, those teams volunteer at hospitals, senior residences, colleges, elementary schools, & libraries throughout the Monadnock Region. Each team is a tribute to Bev's vision that building a humane community includes supporting human contact with animals.

The last time Bev was at MHS was in March for the dedication of the Guinane Training Center, where she and others present were delighted to share the room with three

amazing therapy dog teams. Those dogs provided a living demonstration of the values at the heart of MHS' mission. Bev's therapy dog teams attend both MHS educational and MHS promotional events, carrying the task of helping create a humane community.
